Less than seven percent of hospitals in the country are Magnet recognized and it is considered the highest honor in nursing for quality of care.

“While we take time to celebrate this momentous occasion, I would like to sincerely thank our nurses for their hard work and dedication in providing our patients with the best care,” said Richard Hall, ANMC Chief Nurse Executive. “Our talented nurses are committed to providing innovative, family-centered care every day at ANMC. The Magnet program advances three goals within health care organizations including promoting quality in a setting that supports professional practice, identifying excellence in the delivery of nursing services to patients and residents, and disseminating best practices in nursing services.
